- 1879 State Reform School attracted to Kearney now know as YRTC

- 1915 Kearney Avenue was bricked
- 1915 Seedling Mile constructed on Lincoln Highway (from Kearney spillway at UNK to 30th Ave.)
- 1917 Construction began on Ft. Kearney Hotel
- 1919 Chamber of Commerce established
- 1920 late summer Kearney Amusement Park opened
- 1921 Normal School name change-NE State Normal School and State Teachers College
- 1921 First airport in Keaney, Auxilary Field east of Military Academy
- 1922 March 23 Kearney Amusement Park burned

- 1923 Kearney Military Academy closes due to insufficient enrollement and fire
- 1923 1733 Amusement park opened
- 1924 Lincoln Highway renamed Highway 30
- 1924 Good Samaritan Hospital was built and opened

- 1927 Completion of Fort Kearney Hotel
- 1929 Mt. Carmel Nursing Home started
- 1930 Kearney Military Academy reopens as NYA youth worker center
- 1933 An-ne-var started
- 1937 REA board organized in Buffalo Co.
- 1938 December First electric line energized John Hammans farm, Gibbon
- 1939 A wing was added to the west end of the original pulic library
- 1939 First Electric pump & irrigation district, first electric irrigation pump
- 1939 New City Hall built WPA project
- 1942 Sept construction began on Kearney Air Base, first contingent arrived in Dec
- 1947 Herbert L. Cushing, President of State Teacher's College
- 1948 President Harry Truman attended Sunday worship services at First Baptist Church, June 6th
- 1948 Kearney Military Acadmay was renovated and used as St. Lukes Hospital

- 1950 Kearney's population increased 27%
- 1951 Air base given to Kearney used as air port
 - J.A. Baldwin Manufacturing Co. announced it would move its operations from Wisconsin to Kearney. The
- 1952 company said it would establish its plant in the former Kearney Air Base engineering building. The company began production Feb. 10, 1953.
- 1952 Vice-presidential candidate Richard M. Nixon spoke at Harmon Park.
- 1953 St. Lukes Hospital converted into St. Lukes Home and Center
- 1954 Opera House torn down
 - Rockwell Manufacturing of Pittsburgh announced it would establish a valve plant in Kearney. The
- lubricated plug valves were used for oil pipelines. The building would be constructed by the Kearney Civic Development Corp. through the sale of bonds totaling \$720,000. Dedication was Oct. 19, 1957. Today, the building houses Cabela's.
- 1956 Fire at Airbase Hanger
- The parish purchased 60 acres of land at 35th Street and Avenue A for the city's first Catholic High School.
- 1958 Remodeled the public library
- 1958 Kearney High School was built in North Kearney on 39th St
- Massachusetts Sen. John F. Kennedy, who was seeking the Democratic presidential nomination in 1960,
- visited, October 14th
- 1959 Vice President Richard M. Nixon visited.
- 1959 New jail constructed
- 1960 Construction of DeKalb seed corn plant begins on East Highway 30.
- 1960 Construction on the new Catholic High School began
- 1961 Kearney Catholic High School was "officially established"
- Bids opened on the Grand Island to Kearney segment of Interstate 80. The low bid of \$7.4 million came from Roberts Construction Co. of Lincoln.
- 1962 2nd Avenue overpass was completed
- West Co. of Phoenixville, Pa., announced it would establish a rubber closures plant in the former Bear Hosiery plant. Operations were scheduled to begin Sept. 1.
- 1963 The 40-mile segment of Interstate 80 between Grand Island and Kearney opened.
- 1964 Kearney Catholic Alumni Association was formed
- 1964 GOP presidential candidate Barry Goldwater visited.
 - The Hub recounted the opening of many tourist-related businesses that had started or were under
- 1964 construction as a result of the coming of I-80. Among the new business were three motels, seven gas stations and numerous restaurants.
- 1965 Holiday Inn opens, now Ramada Inn
 - The Midway Hotel was sold as a "going business (with all equipment and supplies), or as real estate,
- 1966 whichever brings the best price." Demolition of the hotel, which was located at 25th Street and Central Avenue where Grand Central IGA sits today, began Sept. 13, 1967.
- 1967 Midway Hotel demolished
- Sen. Robert Kennedy made a campaign stop. Kennedy was assassinated a few weeks after his Kearney visit, April 27th.
- GOP presidential nominee Richard M. Nixon made a campaign stop at the airport and the college, May 7th.
- 1968 Razzing of auditorium at Kearney State College
- 1968 Horizon Middle School was built
- Following a fire that destroyed its former plant, Baldwin Manufacturing opened its new plant on East Highway 30.
- 1969 Eaton Yale and Towne Corp. of Cleveland built a \$5 million, 140,000-square-foot automotive valve plant on 52 acres between the Rockwell and Baldwin plants. The plant was dedicated in September.

- Discussion began on the possibility of a regional airport that would serve Kearney, Hastings and Grand
- 1969 Island. On Aug. 15, Frontier Airlines again reported a planned reduction in the number of flights serving the state.
- 1969 Kearney Chamber's Agriculture Committee established the Gateway Farm Expo.
- The Kearney Planning Commission approved plans for a 160- acre subdivision, including a shopping center, in north Kearney near 48th Street.
- 1969 First United Methodist Church burnt, now home of City Volunteer Fire Department Chimera Corp. was sold to Ag-Tronic of Hastings. The new owner said the plant would remain in
- 1970 Kearney. In 1986, Aq-Tronic became part of Coleman, a manufacturer of outdoor recreation equipment headquartered in Wichita, Kan., and operated as Coleman Powermate.
 - The Fort Kearney Hotel was ordered sold by Judge S.S. Sidner because of \$65,000 in liens against the
- 1971 property. First National Bank of Kearney purchased the building on March 13, 1972, as part of its plan to build a new bank.
- Good Samaritan Hospital announced it would add 50 beds and a shelled-in space for another 50 beds at a cost of \$5.5 million.
- Ramada Inn construction begins northwest of I-80 interchange (operates today as Holiday Inn/Captain's Table)
 - The Tri-Cities Regional Airport study entered its final phase to determine the practicality of an airport to
- 1971 serve Kearney, Hastings and Grand Island. At a Dec. 17 meeting, Kearney and Hastings favored a new regional airport, but Grand Island favored expanding its existing airport.
- 1972 Kearney High wins Class A girls state track championship
- Site preparation begins for construction of the Fort Kearney Inn Hotel SW of I-80 interchange (later named First Inn Gold and then Best Western Inn & Suites)
- 1972 Democratic presidential candidate and South Dakota Sen. George McGovern visited in May.
- 1972 TB hospital closes
- 1972 Fort Kearney Hotel torn down, now the location of Wells Fargo
- 1973 Kearney Orthopedic & Fracture Clinic was formed by Dr. David Wiebe and Dr. Kenneth Ellis.
- 1975 1975 New Kearney Public Library opens and replaces Carnegie Library
- The original St. Luke's Home was to be closed by Oct. 7. The building was about 90 years old. In 1912, it had been site of the Kearney Public Hospital.
- 1975 New Courthouse opened
- 1976 Former California Gov. Ronald Reagan spoke at the college.
- 1976 Original Buffalo Co. Courthouse razed to make way for present courthouse
- 1976 Kearney High wins Class B boys state tennis championship
- 1977 Kearney High wins Class A boys state cross country championship
- 1978 Justus Dobesh became Kearney Mayor. Term ended in 1989.
- 1978 Kearney High wins Class A state volleyball championship over Grand Island NW, 15-4, 15-12
- 1979 Kearney Catholic wins Class B girls state tennis championship
- 1980 GSH dedicated its 50,000-square-foot addition. About 1,000 people toured the new facility.
- President Jimmy Carter stopped on his 1980 campaign for re-election. He was in Grand Island to survey 1980 tornado damage, in June.
- A \$500,000 CAT scanner arrived at GSH. Purchased by Kearney radiologists, it was the first full-body scanner between Scottsbluff and Lincoln.
- 1981 Baldwin Manufacturing Co. was sold to J.L. Clark Manufacturing Co. of Rockford, Ill., for \$46 million.
- 1982 Kearney High girls win Class A state basketball championship, 43-42 over Lincoln, NE
- Rockwell International laid off 65 employees. During the recession of 1982, Rockwell, Baldwin, Eaton and West Co. would announce layoffs affecting more than 260 employees.
- 1983 Plans to build Hilltop Mall shopping center in north Kearney were announced.
- 1984 Kearney Catholic girls win Class C2 state basketball championship, over Scribner, 59-55
- The downtown renovation project got under way. The project was to cost \$1.4 million, with part of the money coming from two grants totaling \$360,000. Kearney Centre was dedicated Oct. 19.

- Ground was broken for the \$5.1 million Richard Young Hospital, a psychiatric facility. A clinic opened
- 1984 Feb. 7, 1985, and the main hospital was scheduled to open in June 1986. The facility merged with Good Samaritan Hospital July 1987.
- 1984 Hilltop Mall opened with Wal-Mart and Herberger's as anchor stores.
- 1984 The Fort Theater closed after almost 50 years on Central Avenue.
- 1985 Kearney High wins Class B boys state tennis championship
- 1985 Kearney Catholic girls win Class C2 state basketball championship, over Grant, 47-43
- 1985 Rockwell announced it would cease production Sept. 1 and close its plant by Oct. 1.
- 1986 Kearney Catholic wins Class C boys state track championship
- 1986 Kearney High wins Class B boys state tennis championship
- Cabela's of Sidney, one of the nation's largest mail order outdoor recreation and sporting goods companies, purchased the vacant Rockwell building.
- 1986 Established Buffalo County Economic Development Corporation

 The Kearney Post Office building was purchased and opened as the Museum of Nebraska Art in
 1986 October, 1986.
- 1987 Chamber of Commerce Envoy's Established the Friend of Kearney Award
- 1988 Democratic presidential candidate Jesse Jackson visited.
 - An era ended when GSH took over emergency medical services from the Kearney Volunteer Fire
- 1988 Department. The department had provided emergency assistance for more than 50 years.
- 1989 Ron Larsen became Kearney Mayor. Term ended in 1994.
- Kearney voters approved a 1-percent city sales tax. It was estimated the tax would raise \$1.2 million a year.
- Kearney State College became the University of Nebraska at Kearney. Chancellor William Nester said, "We look back ... to recognize those who brought this institution to this day."
- 1991 The Kearney Hub completes construction of its new building and production facility at 13 E. 22nd St.
- 1991 First class of Leadership Kearney established
- 1992 Kearney High wins Class A state girls golf team championship
- 1992 Chamber of Commerce ag committee established Nebraska Cattlemen's Classic
- 1992 NPPD, formely known as Conusmers Public Power relocated to 4th & 4th Ave.
- 1992 Fire destroyed L&W Service Center at 25th Street and Central Avenue. Black smoke billowed for hours as firefighters struggled to extinguish one of the most spectacular downtown fires in Kearney's history.
- 1992 GOP vice presidential candidate Dan Quayle visited.
- 1993 Current GOP vice-presidential candidate Dick Cheney was a guest speaker at the Nebraska Republican Party Founders' Day luncheon. He had lived with his grandparents in Sumner from 1944-1946.
- 1993 \$18 Million school bond issues passes creating Meadowlark Elementary and Sunrise Middle School
- 1993 Sears closes its downtown store
- 1993 The Museum of Nebraska Art building addition and renovation was dedicated in October, 1993.
- 1993 Meadowlark Hills Golf Course opens, the City of Kearney's first municipal golf course
- 1994 Pete Kotsiopulos became Kearney Mayor. Term ended in 2002.
- 1994 Good Samaritan Hospital completes a \$20 million expansion
- 1994 Kearney High wins Class A state girls golf team championship
- 1994 Kearney High wins Class A boys state track championship
 - The Kearney Area YMCA hosted a grand opening at its new facility at 4500 Sixth Ave. The building,

- Plans were announced to build an arch across Interstate 80 near Kearney. The project, the dream of
- ¹⁹⁹⁶ former Gov. Frank Morrison, was to be called The Great Platte River Road Archway Monument.

 - 1999 Road Archway Monument across the highway at 10 p.m. At eight stories high, the length of a football field and 1,500 tons, it was believed to be the largest structure ever moved in the state.
