Season Twelve

Another season is over. It is time to look back and see what the team and some individual players have done. There were only 19 one-point games this season compared to 26 last season. But there were 13 one point wins this season compared to 10 last season. Five of those games went into overtime. One

was won in overtime and four in shoot outs. Only six games were lost by a point this season compared to 16 last season. One game was lost in overtime, none in shootouts.

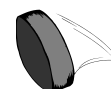

Hockey Timeline

1911

Teams in Western Canada formed the Pacific
Coast Hockey Association. The league
introduced several innovations: Blue lines were
added to divide the ice into three zones,
goaltenders were permitted to fall to the ice to

make saves and forward passing was allowed in
the neutral zone. The 60 minute game was
divided into three 20 minute periods.

The number of players allowed on the ice was
reduced from seven to six per team.

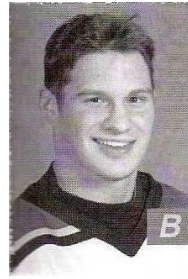
Mark Van Guilder

Mark Van Guilder played 119 of 120 regular season games for the Storm during the 2002-3 and 2003-4 seasons. From here he went to Notre Dame where he participated in every game during his four years, 2004-2008, on that team. He was captain of the team his senior year and graduated with a major in sociology.

Mark played for the Cincinnati Cyclones in the ECHL during the 2008-09 season. He was called up to the AHL during the season to play 3 games for the Hamilton Bulldogs and 5 games for the Milwaukee Admirals. During the following season he played only 15 games for Cincinnati and the other 28 for the Admirals. For the past two seasons Mark has continued to play for the Milwaukee Admirals.

During his free time both in college and now as he plays professionally, Mark has been involved in many community activities with children. While at Notre Dame he participated in the team's annual Buddy Walk fundraiser for Down's Syndrome children, the annual Christmas party for under privileged children, and volunteered as a youth hockey coach.

For the past three years with the Milwaukee Admirals, Mark has been the winner of the IOA/American Specialty AHL Man of the Year award for his activities in Milwaukee. He has worked with the Boys & Girls Clubs of Milwaukee, visited Ronald McDonald House and the Children's Hospital of Wisconsin, visited schools to participate in reading programs and talk about sportsmanship, and visited church groups to talk about how being a hockey player is affected by his faith. Mark has tutored a local student in reading and writing skills and was a celebrity waiter in a fundraiser for blindness prevention.

Marty Mjelleli

Marty Mjelleli, of Faribault, MN, started his junior hockey career in the BCHL playing most of the season for the Prince George Spruce Kings. Then he joined the Tri-City Storm in 2002. He was traded to Des Moines after Christmas, along with Tom Morrow and Pat Borgestad, for Steve Wagner and Ryan Dingle. Marty stayed in Des Moines the following season and then went on to four years at St. Cloud.

Following college, Marty signed with Gwinnet in Duluth, GA, in the ECHL, played 2 games, and then went to the Johnstown Chiefs

where he played 14 games. Then in February 2009 he joined the Buccaneers as assistant coach and scout for the remainder of the season. The following season, 2009-10, Marty went to Holland where he played for the Amsterdam Tigers and the Nijmegen Devils.

Marty started last season as an assistant coach head Minnesota scout for Des Moines. He was also in his second season as assistant coach at St. Olaf, a DIII school in Minnesota. When Regg Simon left the Buccaneers' head coaching position, Marty was named associate coach.
